# Is your department prepared to deal with an individual with autism?

The goal of the Autism Society of Greater Orlando's Autism Awareness Training for First Responders is to ensure that first responders are prepared with the knowledge to handle this unique developmental disability

It is our mission to train police, fire, and search and rescue departments across the State of Florida to recognize the characteristics of autism, learn how to interact and respond to individuals with autism, while insuring the safety and security of all involved.

This training program will consist of classroom instruction and live interactions with individuals with autism. The focus of the training will be to provide the skills necessary to identify, interact, and respond to individuals with autism

In the training, the officers will be taught ways to de-escalate a situation and bring the situation to a peaceful resolution while avoiding possible injury and/or death to those involved.

# AUTISM AWARENESS TRAINING FOR FIRST RESPONDERS

Police, Fire & EMS encounter individuals in different situations. Just as each situation differs from the next, so does the individual involved. Civil Service Personnel are trained to respond to situations but are not trained to deal with individuals with an Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD).

Because First Responders are first to respond to an emergency, it is critical that they have a working knowledge of ASD, and the wide variety of behaviors individuals with autism can exhibit in emergency situations.

Autism is America's fastest growing developmental disability. You will meet children and adults with autism

An estimated 1.5 million individuals in the U.S. and tens of millions worldwide are affected by autism.

Today, it is estimated that 1 in every 68 children is diagnosed with autism, making it more common than childhood cancer, juvenile diabetes and pediatric AIDS combined.

The cause or origin of Autism is still a mystery.





## **Course Objectives**

- Identify and apply techniques when interviewing or interrogating an individual with autism.
- Interact with individuals with autism
